Mike's message ...

Let your light shine!

**“LET your light so shine before men,
that they may see your good works,
and glorify your Father which is in heaven”.**
*(St. Matthew 5.16, quoted from
The Book of Common Prayer 1662)*



At the beginning of December we enter the season of Advent - a time of waiting, and of preparing ourselves for the arrival of Jesus Christ. Not just celebrating his birth two millennia ago, but preparing our hearts, minds and lives to welcome him when his Kingdom comes in its fullness. It's also a time of preparation to celebrate Christmas in other ways; buying that turkey, posting cards and, of course, giving presents.

One of the themes of Advent is light. We light a candle each week as we recall the great themes of God's journey with his people. Many churches hold Christingle Services (*Sunday 15th December 10.30am here*) celebrating Jesus Christ as Light of the World.

Thomas Cranmer placed the quotation above, from Matthew's Gospel, in his Prayer Book of 1549. It remained in the 1549 and 1662 're-writes'. Cranmer placed the verse just before the '*Alms for the Poor and other devotions of the people*' were collected. As a reformer, it was certainly no intention of Cranmer to link the giving of money with the "good works" mentioned in the verse. Far from it, opposing such a link that had driven much of the Reformation! Instead the "good works" would be evident in the almsgiving to the poor that was carried out by the church as a community. The church was called to be a Light to the World - and it still is.

The Cotteridge Church is a place where lives are transformed. From the Day Centre providing company for those who might otherwise be alone, to the Food Bank giving hope in times of crisis. From the Safe Space of the Youth Café, to the friendship of Thursday evening Coffee and Chat. The Cotteridge Church is called to be a Light to the World.

Running and maintaining all this takes money. It's a fact of life. As Christmas approaches, and we spend money on presents for loved ones, I invite us all to giving an extra present - a financial gift to the church's work - over and above what we give week by week. We are starting Advent this year with a Gift Day. Can we make an extra donation? Give a special Christmas Present, to the transforming work of The Cotteridge Church? We can give in cash, cheque or BACS. In doing so we can help the Light of Hope to burn on for others and our community, and transform lives through the love of God.

**May the good works of transforming lives continue to give glory to God.
Amen.**



The Cotteridge Church turned 30 in February 2019. We put on a display to mark the occasion, but as well as looking back we decided to plan a second celebration with the focus on Looking Forward. Big display boards were borrowed from our friends at St Lawrence & Selly Oak Methodist church, and on Saturday 28th September we opened our doors to the public. They discovered the Malvern Room had been filled with 19 groups eager to talk about their organisation. We had the Guides (along with Rainbows, Brownies and Rangers), the Boys' Brigade, the Book Club, the B30 Foodbank, the Building Steering Group, Bumps & Babies, Saplings & Messy Church, C2U, Cotteridge Country Walkers, the Day Centre, the Gardening Club, Pennine Way Coach Trips, the Tuesday Fellowship, not forgetting Traidcraft, The Cotteridge Church services and Volunteering! With banners and balloons, it became a great showcase for the community presence of our Church, a visible display of how we engage with Cotteridge.



On Sunday morning we had a 'Life & Soul' service on the theme of Vision. This included asking the congregation to note the date on which they joined any part of The Cotteridge Church and then form a line in date order with the longest serving member at the back and the newest member at the front – it

went from 1935 to 2019! We also sang our own 'In this year of celebration' hymn written by Rita Sutton*.



Our thanks to everyone involved. Perhaps 'Open Church' should be an annual event?



From the Ministers



It was great fun to attend and take part in the celebration of 30 years of the Cotteridge Church. I met many old friends and made a few new ones. I was impressed by all the things that go on at the church and in particular the ways you serve the community. As mentioned in my few short words my hopes and prayers for you are that you continue to demonstrate the “style” of Jesus which was and is “holy hospitality”.

Thank you so much for inviting me to return to the Cotteridge Church to share in your celebrations of thirty years of working together. When I was stationed with you in 1997, it was almost too good to be believed, given my deep concern about the divisions in the wider church.

I was not disappointed in the way that you were already working as one, denominational differences being seen by many as an enrichment of faith, rather than a divisive matter. I felt privileged to spend eight years with you, able to focus on the pastoral care, the deepening of faith, learning about life in a city - having spent most of my life in rural places. Having an administrator to cope with the inevitable, unavoidable matters which govern public institutions, was a great relief.

I met in the coffee bar, people whose paths would not have crossed mine, encountering many whose basic needs were not being met elsewhere. They did receive care and often food from us, but we too received insights, care and friendship. It was a privilege to be with people for the celebrations and the sadnesses of their lives, a way of reaching out just as we are taught by Jesus.

Study groups of various kinds illustrated Michael Blood’s comment when I arrived, that “This is a church where you don’t have to leave your brain outside the door”. This was enhanced by the best church book shop I have ever encountered, thanks to Roger and Jane.

Rita Sutton’s trips to Israel, Jordan and Oberammergau bonded many of us, as did the monthly coach trips. It was lovely to welcome visitors for many years to the little church across the road from my house in Warwickshire.

Returning to be among you recalled so many memories of people and events. It was good to see familiar faces, but also to see new ones, demonstrating that this is not a church hanging on despite falling membership. It is so healthy to realise that some activities had ceased to have a useful life, but there are new ones, especially the food bank fulfilling the role of the church to care for all. It was good too to see those who were young parents when I was with you, now clearly shouldering leadership roles. (When we queued up in the service, according to when we came to the church, it was



lovely to be told by the young man in front of me that I had baptised him). In so many churches, elderly people struggle on but you are fortunate there. I shall continue to pray for you as a shining light in what has become a dark world. I treasure all my memories of being with you. Very sincerely, Ros

It was lovely to be back at Cotteridge church to share in your anniversary celebrations. It was especially good to renew acquaintance with 'old' friends and see their continued faithfulness as disciples in the life of the church. It was also good to see evidence of renewal in the involvement of new people, new initiatives and projects which are a response to fresh needs and opportunities.

I found the time line we formed in Sunday's service during the singing of the hymn 'let us build a house' very moving. It was a visual reminder of the fact that we stand in a long line of witnesses.

At the back of the church there was a large gathering, symbolising the strong foundations of faith the Cotteridge church builds on, with new shoots stretching forward to the present day. I was conscious too, of those I had known who are no longer with us, those who are now part of the communion of saints, in whose lives the vision of the church had also been lived out and handed on.

The weekend evoked many rich memories for me. I am so grateful for the friendship, collegiality, worship, learning and opportunities for service I knew at Cotteridge. Once again I realise how privileged I am to have been a minister there. Thank you for a special weekend and the glimpse of how you are continuing the church's ministry.

The Cotteridge Church Joint Church Council

Summary of Proceedings 25th September 2019

Key Decisions

1. The JCC agreed that the B30 Foodbank Van could park at the front of the Church two days a week.
2. The JCC agreed that CCDC staff would assist in putting the 'No Parking' barrier across the entrance of the Car Park and co-ordinate with the Ring and Ride drivers to let them have access.
3. The JCC agreed that the Car Park could be used for B30 Foodbank customers for immediate pick-ups only and this would be co-ordinated by Foodbank volunteers.
4. The JCC approved the role outline for the Pennine Way trip co-ordinator.
5. The JCC agreed that David Pycock should pursue an improved heating control system with Swart Service Solutions.
6. The JCC decided that the new Chairs in the Malvern Room would be of a uniform colour, rather than multi-coloured as per the example of Cambridge Road.
7. It was agreed that old chairs should be sold when the new Chairs were in use.
8. The JCC agreed that there should be a Christmas Tree outside the Church again this year.
9. It was agreed that Saplings could store a wheeled bookcase on the west wall of the Malvern Room.
10. It was agreed that the Church should host a Youth Café and Safe space on Wednesdays from 15:30.

Summary Proceedings

1. An issue around the use of the Car Park preventing the CCDC Ring and Ride buses accessing the Church to deliver or collect customers was discussed at length.
2. The meeting discussed the implementation of a more sophisticated heating control system proposed by the Administrator, to enable better control of the Church's heating.
3. It was with sadness the JCC accepted the resignation of Peter Rookes as a trustee. Peter has been finding it hard to attend the JCC meetings with all the other charitable work he performs.
The JCC thanked Peter Rookes for all the hard work and effort he has put in on behalf of the Church.
4. It was reported that the membership of the Church had reduced to 165.
5. It was noted that the Deanery Chapter of the Anglican Church were at The Cotteridge Church this month and celebrated eucharist in the URC manner.
6. It was announced that the Christmas Fair would be held on 30th November 2019.
7. It was noted that the Anglican Diocese were not able to offer face to face C0 and C1 training to catering services for the foreseeable future.
8. The meeting discussed more convenient storage for the Sapling Group.

The next meeting of the Joint Church Council will be on Thursday 17th October 2019 at 19:30.

A Call to Action - There's a role for everyone



Having attended The United Reformed Church Synod recently I would like to share with everyone just a little of what struck a chord with me during the event. We have been talking a great deal for seemingly a very long time now at Cotteridge about Vision, our vision for the church and The Cotteridge Church in particular. The following struck a chord:

*Vision: A picture of the future that produces **passion**.*

*Without **passion** then the vision will fall flat.*

*We **must** focus our energy as we **cannot** do everything!*

Discipleship – All Christians should be growing disciples, and all disciples should be growing as leaders.

Leadership is for all, it is not about the top man (or woman) minister or members of the church council. Leadership is about:

- *Caring- for the church*
- *Shepherding – tending- providing a safe space*
- *Being a rôle model- “follow me as I follow Christ”*
- *Teaching- passing of the faith*
- *Parenting- helping others develop and mature*

All the above are nurturing roles, not about exercising authority or domination.

Leadership is character based, rather than status or rank

*We are **ALL** called to be leaders and are **ALL** equipped for some role.*

- *We can show the way – by example*
- *We grow leaders by growing character, which is done through deepening our discipleship*
- *We can mentor others – helping them grow in faith and discipleship*
- ***Everyone must do something***

*Churches must have a **secretary** (Church Structure) and a **treasurer** (Charities Act) That does not mean though that one person must do the job on their own, if the work load is too onerous, then break the role down so as to share the load.*

One analogy given was: if there's no one to arrange the flowers then don't have flowers, the church won't fall down and the Holy Spirit won't be angered!

*Do **what** we **can** and do it **well!***

We heard of a church that asked the community it served what they needed / wanted. The response was “a playground”. The church had land so let the community know that although the church would not be able to fund the building of a playground they could provide the land.

Together the community and church provided an essential provision for the area. Later a café was installed too.

- Reminds me of Cotteridge having the youth room and coffee bar, which is now available for a safe space for youth on a Wednesday afternoon.

We don't always need to provide everything, sometimes we can be facilitators.

We must all do something

We must ALL do something! That was the message given to those attending the URC Synod recently.

Some are no doubt thinking “I've done my bit”, “I'm too old”, “I'm too young”. Synod says NO to all of these thoughts. ALL MUST DO SOMETHING!

Do what though?

The list is almost limitless, there are numerous tasks that we can be called upon, asked to take on, or offer to do.

As we approach Advent (time of preparation), perhaps on this coming Stir-Up Sunday, besides stirring up our Christmas cake mixture, we could take the opportunity to Stir-Up ourselves. To wake ourselves up to the issues affecting our World, our Nation, our Local Community and Ourselves!

It is often all too easy to get complacent and simply take things for granted.

Perhaps during the coming Advent period we could take the opportunity to shake ourselves up a little and consider our own role within our church, within the community and within our family?

What can we do? *Well, Anything!*

No matter our age or our abilities, there is a role for everyone!

No matter how small our contribution may seem, it can have a huge effect upon others.

A friendly word, a cheerful smile, a happy welcoming greeting are worth a million pounds to a lonely person.

- Volunteer – gardening, serving on the coffee bar, helping at Saplings, etc, etc.
- Try a new activity
- Join a working group
- Help at any of the events held here throughout the year: setting up, clearing away, selling or simply joining in and chatting with visitors
- Visit the coffee bar, to have a snack or simply to meet others, there's always likely to be someone in need of a chat
- Share your skills and expertise – perhaps you could start your own group of crafts or a games group, who knows?
- Come to meetings
- Write an article for the Roundabout magazine – about your life, a skill you have, or an interest you could share with others

In the words of the URC Moderator “We MUST all do something!”

Don't wait to be asked! Some folk are so busy doing multiple tasks that they can't go around seeking new helpers, if you have time to spare, skills to share and love meeting others then – What are you waiting for?

HAY GREEN METHODIST CHURCH

Hay Green Methodist Church held its last regular monthly morning worship in July this year, and on 29th September they held a Thanksgiving Service to celebrate 87 years of worship and praise.

The Church opened in 1932 to serve a growing community in Bournville, the same year as the coming together of the larger Methodist denominations, indeed it was the only Methodist Church to open in that year. The foundation stone was laid by Dame Elizabeth Cadbury, in commemoration of the Methodist



Union, along with stones laid on behalf of Selly Oak Primitive Methodist Church, Stirchley United Methodist Church and Kings Norton Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The service was led by the Reverend Donald Sampson, (minister for the last two years), the speaker was the Reverend Jane Wilson, previously a member at Hay Green but now a minister in Keynsham near Bristol, and the traditional and rousing hymns were chosen by Church members.

In the congregation were people who had special memories of Hay Green; Church members, people who had been baptised or married at the Church, as well as friends and supporters from across the Circuit.

After the service the celebrations continued with a shared lunch.

National Interfaith Week, this year occurs between Sat 9th and Sun 17th November, for which the Birmingham Council of Faiths is again coordinating the Birmingham programme. The aims of Interfaith Week are to strengthen interfaith relations at all levels; increase awareness of the different and distinct faith communities in the UK, in particular celebrating and building on the contribution which their members make to their neighbourhoods and to wider society; and to increase understanding between people of religious and non-religious beliefs. The event will be officially opened by the Lord Mayor at the Launch event in the Council House at 2.0pm on Wed 6th Nov. Please let me know if you wish to attend.

We interpret the week liberally in the Birmingham programme to avoid too many clashes of dates. Including the launch event, there are 15 events in total. They are all open for anyone to attend with the exception of those stated to be CLOSED or by INVITATION. There is a wide range of activities including discussions, celebrations, spiritual reflection, health and environmental seminars, and a fun evening.
