The **Cotswold Room** was recently redecorated by the volunteer group. After putting paint on walls we decided to replace the carpet flooring. The result was better than we might have thought. Many thanks to all who rolled up their sleeves and applied the



glue before carefully laying the new carpet tiles.

We have had s e v e r a l



positive comments from church members.Following on from that improvement Mike Ravenhill has obtained quotes to replace the single glazed windows with new double glazed ones, hopefully making the room even better at retaining heat and improving the letting frequency.

An area of the **Malvern Room** had suffered an ingress of water from the outside



roof. Dev Sampla was called in to fix the roof problem then we waited a while for things to

dry out. Eventually Dev was asked to return so that he (and his employees) could repair the plaster. As you can see it required high scaffolding and professional expertise so the volunteer group stood back on this one.

The **Clee Room** has also recently been redecorated, but at that time we decided to leave replacing the carpet. With a success in laying tiles in the Cotswold Room the volunteer group decided to lay new tiles in the Clee Room. We have recently been joined by a new volunteer, Bill Brown, and he is proving a valuable asset. As well as stripping floors of stuck foam he is prepared to point brickwork on the roof when the weather is suitable. In short, the property volunteers have recently added their time and energy to keeping the church premises up to scratch for the cost of the materials.

This year Christian Aid celebrates 80 years of supporting some of the poorest, most dispossessed people in the world across all faiths, those with no faith, and all ethnicities. Fundraising efforts are understandably concentrated on Christian Aid Week which this year is from May 12th to May 17th but their projects and campaigns continue all year and every year. Thanks to CA children in Syria have been able to restart their education following the earthquakes in 2023, and in Rafah, Gaza, Palestinian children have been given brief respite from war and encouraged to keep their culture alive.

During Christian Aid week this year the focus is on Aurelia, a farmer and community leader from Guatemala, where gruelling heatwaves and extreme weather are destroying her crops and her farm and livelihood. This illustrates the urgent need for CA's Restore Campaign which seeks to challenge the reckless corporations that are driving the climate and debt crises which are trapping millions of people in poverty. The financial system that most of us live by was developed by the so called developed countries and is stacked against low income countries which the rich countries have traditionally colonised and robbed of their resources. This perpetuates a cycle of debt and allows greedy lenders to prey on the most vulnerable, like Aurelia, robbing them of their dignity and denying them the opportunity to make their lives better.

The UK Government is uniquely placed to make polluters pay and leaders to cancel debts. Many of the world's biggest polluters have headquarters in the UK and 90% of debts owed by low income countries to private companies are governed by UK law. CA have a petition for you to sign and to share and they are organising regular online webinars and workshops if you would like to know more.

Charles Wesley

Commemorated on ²4th May - in the Anglican Church Charles Wesley was born 18 Dec 1707 in Epworth, Lincolnshire, the 18th child of parents Susanna & Samuel and where his father was rector of the local parish church of St Andrew.

He died on 29 Mar 1788 in London

He was an English Anglican cleric and a principal leader of the Methodist movement. He was a prolific hymn writer who wrote over 6,500 hymns during his lifetime, many of which are still frequently sung now. Some of the more familiar include:



- •"And Can It Be That I Should Gain?"
 - •"Christ the Lord Is Risen Today"
 - •"Hark! The Herald Angels Sing"
 - •"Lo! He Comes with Clouds Descending"
 - •"Love Divine, All Loves Excelling"
 - •"O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing"
 - •"O Thou Who Camest from Above"
 - •"Rejoice, the Lord is King"
 - •"Soldiers of Christ, Arise"

He was educated at Oxford University,

where his brothers had also studied, and he formed the "Holy Club" among his fellow students in 1729. His older brother John founded the Methodist Church. He followed his father and brother into the ministry in 1735, and travelled widely though Britain converting followers to Methodism. In 1749 he married Sarah Gwynne, the daughter of a Welsh convert.

Although he promoted Methodism, he did not want this to be separated from the Anglican church, unlike his brother John, who wanted them to be separate.

After a period of illness he settled in Bristol in 1756, and then, finally in Marylebone, London, where there is a blue plaque on the site of his [now demolished] home.

A Beacon of Unity: Reflections on My Visit to The Cotteridge Church, Birmingham

Today, I had the profound privilege of visiting The Cotteridge Church, a beautiful ecumenical partnership of The Methodist Church, The Church of England, and The United Reformed Church. From the moment I arrived, I was embraced with a warmth and hospitality that truly reflected the spirit of Christ—a spirit of love, openness, and brotherhood. My deepest gratitude to Chris Martin and all the wonderful members of the church for their gracious welcome and for fostering an environment where hearts and minds can meet in mutual respect.

Our discussions were fruitful, enlightening, and deeply moving, as we explored matters of faith, scripture, and tradition. What struck me most was the shared commitment to understanding one another, not merely as representatives of different traditions, but as fellow seekers of truth and servants of the Divine. These conversations are not just exchanges of ideas—they are bridges built over the divides that too often separate us.

Let us never grow weary of reaching out, listening deeply, and standing together. For in unity, there is strength. In understanding, there is hope. The Cotteridge Church Joint Church Council Summary of Proceedings Thursday 13th March 2025

The meeting opened with a short prayer. Roger shared a new update on Jane S.,

Minutes of previous meeting held on 15th January 2025:

The minutes were agreed as being a true record.

Matters arising:

<u>Ministry</u> going forward: Tariro M., has been appointed to be an Associate Priest here and Incumbent at the Church of Ascension – Stirchley. Awaiting news of her Licensing Service.

AV System: See item on Agenda.

Staff Handbook: Awaiting a review – in hand.

<u>Church Memorials</u>: Jane S., has met with the Churchwarden at King's Norton. They do have provision for memorials to be stored should we be able to locate them. Awaiting further information.

List of members names together with their Pastoral Link name. A list has been collated and printed; this is available from the church office.

<u>Chair stacking</u>: A notice covering the safe stacking of chairs is now in place in Malvern Room: It was noted that some people have not seen the notice. For safety, members are asked to speak to anyone stacking chairs above 25 and 6 free-standing and direct them to the notice.

Safeguarding:

No issues have been raised.

Reports:

<u>CSC</u>: The report had been circulated. There were no items that required approval from JCC. BB numbers have improved / Saplings numbers are varied, story time has been re-introduced / Knit and natter is expanding to use Cotswold Room / Conversations with MFA are ongoing /A lending library for tools is being explored / The exercise class has regular attendees / A yoga class for ladies only has started / Good progress is being made with the Social Justice Plan: key dates are on the church calendar / Roundabout will continue to have regular features, and the Let's End Poverty poster is now the default poster on the Tower noticeboard / Donations have come in for the Lent Meal Vouchers – to date 72 vouchers have been paid for / A Christian Aid tea is to be held in the Coopers family garden on the afternoon of 18th May.

The way in which the meal vouchers are to be used was discussed, and also how the donated money would be used should the vouchers not be redeemed – Vouchers will be numbered, only given out through the FoodBank, a clipboard with a list of vouchers will be put in place, this will note names too - remaining funds to be used to provide meals through the hardship fund.

The report covered the first year aims of the CSC Strategy.

Worship: The report was presented to the meeting and dealt with the Lent course, memorials, from Feedback from the URC minister overseeing Cotteridge and the

new Pastorate, mentioned that the Profile did not contain much information on what the church does in the community. The Profile will be looked at by JCC Chair to determine what it covers – and update as necessary.

A discussion took place on the arrangement of chairs for some services – whilst it is felt not everyone is happy with how they are arranged at times – some visitors find having different arrangements to be most welcome. Trying various settings and having tables and chairs out for Parade services will continue.

Action: Chair to review the profile for the URC

<u>P&M</u>: Apologies given for the late circulation of the report – No feedback or approval required. The report covered the maintenance that have been handled and noted the difficulty in obtaining quotations for ongoing work.

It was reported that quotations for replacement windows in Cotswold had been received – these to be referred to P&M for a speedy acceptance and work to be ordered.

<u>EcoChurch</u> – articles on the environment appear regularly in Roundabout, and the noticeboard in Pennine Way has been updated. Sandra W., was thanked for her work on Eco matters and for keeping members and visitors aware on environmental issues. A formal vote of thanks was requested to be given to the team for the work carried out in tackling the redecoration works. Plans are taking shape to refurbish the vanity unit in the female toilets.

It was noted that tackling maintenance tasks in-house will continue as long as tasks are within the skill set of volunteers, and the intended timescale for projects is reasonable.

<u>Administrator</u>: Alcohol on church premises – the rules concerning serving alcohol in a Methodist building had been circulated – the current position is that alcohol is not permitted except for Anglican Holy Communion - following discussion it was agreed that the Administrator be permitted to explore the possibility of receiving permission to serve alcohol here, clarification of what 'Conference' means – to be looked into as it is felt the use of alcohol would assist in meeting the church objectives as set out in the strategic plan.

Issue concerning the difficulty of getting signatories for expense claims and Invoices. The meeting agreed that all JCC members become signatories. Newly elected, co-opted and ex-officio members will automatically be a signatory, retiring members will be removed from the signatory list. The Administrator will be requested to make documents requiring authorisation to be available on a Sunday.

The church is awaiting SMS – the heating engineers to inspect the pipes in Pennine Way over the summer months – JCC are happy for this work to be carried out on the condition that an estimate of costs is discussed prior to any work being undertaken – there should be no work begun in which the costs are unknown.

The question of the radiators in Malvern room being unfit for purpose was deemed to be inaccurate – the main issue it is felt is the controls and settings.

Action: Chair to notify Administrator of decisions reached.

<u>CTB30</u>: meeting to take place next week -20^{th} March 2025.

Finance: The accounts have been circulated for approval.

The projected income and expenditure figures which make up the main Budget have also been circulated. The Budgets for specific groups are being issued shortly.

The Treasurer informed the meeting that the Reserves Policy requires amending – as a employer we need to budget for redundancy payments – An estimated figure

has been taken into consideration in making the calculations. The Policy will be updated shortly.

Approval of the accounts was proposed, seconded and approved.

The accounts will be forward to the Independent Examiner following the meeting.

Action: Final Budget figures to be circulated – Reserves Policy to be amended. Accounts to be forwarded to the Independent Examiner.

Correspondence:

Line Manager for Administrator will remain unchanged until a future Minister can take over.

AV system: The latest quotation was received following the meeting with Practical AV in January. The quotation exceeds the proposed budget mentioned at that meeting. The issue was raised as to whether a new system is necessary as no funding has been put aside. The treasurer confirmed that while funding is available, the costs involved may be better used elsewhere. As previous meetings have determined a new system is to be sourced and following suggestions received from two representatives who have been part of the group exploring AV solutions, it is proposed we move forward with the upgrade by removing some items it is felt we can do without – mainly the 65" screen, stand and cables, and the two smaller monitors, stand and cables – in addition it is hoped that the annual maintenance charges may be negotiable. An additional suggestion is that members may be approached to make donations towards the cost. It was agreed that the Administrator was to be asked to liaise with Practical AV as soon as possible and have the upgrade work undertaken.

Action: Administrator to liaise with Practical AV in amending the quotation and having the required work carried out.

Mention was made of suggestions received for decoration of the Malvern Room, the ideas will be kept in mind for looking at in greater details at a future date. <u>Membership</u>: Currently stands at 71.

The treasurer informed the meeting that the Administrator had successfully applied for a grant from the City Council - $\pounds 3,000$ was gratefully received earlier this month. Thanks were expressed for her timely application.

Action: Committee chairs to be notified of the presentation for 18/05.

<u>Future meetings</u>: 16/07., 18/09., 11/11., AGM 18/05 following morning worship – a light lunch will be available.

There being no further business, the meeting closed with The Grace at 21:25

Sultana Sponge

I have had quite a few good comments about this, so I thought I would share the recipe. All my sponge cakes have the same basic mixture:- the weight of the eggs in margarine and sugar, and about 25% extra flour. Then you can add extra flavours such as vanilla, lemon or orange juice & zest, coffee, cocoa, nuts, or you could use soft brown sugar. It will work with all sizes and numbers of egg too.

I use large eggs, which weigh about 2.5 ounces each. Usually for this variety, I use 4 eggs, which make an ~ 12 " square cake. So:

Ingredients:

soft brown sugar	10 oz	Large eggs	4
baking margarine	10 oz	Sultanas	5 oz approx
Self raising flour	12/13 oz	Demerara sugar	handful
Mathad		e	

Method

Place sugar & margarine in a mixing bowl and cream together.

Beat eggs, and weigh flour. Add about a quarter of the egg mix to the creamed fat & sugar, and mix in. Add about a quarter of the flour & mix in. Repeat this until all egg and flour are added. Mix in the sultanas.

Transfer the mixture into a large baking tin and spread so that it is about 1 inch deep, and make it slightly higher at the edges than the middle, so that it bakes flat.

Sprinkle Demerara sugar thinly and evenly over the top.

Bake in a medium oven [$\sim 170^{\circ}$ C fan] for about 20-25 minutes, until a skewer pushed into it comes out cleanly. Leave to cool in the tin, and then cut up into pieces.

You can use coarsely chopped cooking apple [peeled and cored first] instead of the sultanas, to make a sponge pudding. Then serve with custard or cream.

Enjoy!

When I bake cakes for a church celebration, I use a 12" square tin, and each layer has a 4 egg cake mix [just to give you an idea of the amount of cake you get from a 4 egg mixture]. A normal 8" diameter needs a 2 egg mix.

In San Juan Evangelista there was a celebration for Gregoria as she celebrated 90 years (NOT usual here; 2.5% reach 80), during which she succeeded in talking about the importance of having Jesús in our lives. She was also present at the first "Almuerzo para Abuelitos" (lunch

for senior citizens) in SJE in

March. In JEN these lunches continue to be popular, especially since most of those who attend are "founders" of El Nazareno which was founded in 1981 (when, like Villa el Salvador, there was no running water, electricity etc.)

As for work with young people, in SJE there is now a new leader for the group – Luis. Please pray for him as well as for Deyanira and Esteban, the young people who have been doing this. They have had a bonfire on the little hill by the Church, been to see a Christian film at the cinema, and other activities

Please continue to pray for Peru. President Dina Boluarte has an approval rating of 4%, as does Congress. Extreme poverty is about a third of the

population (several families in both JEN and SJE are in this category) despite Peru having one of the best economic growth levels in Latin America (due to copper prices). However the main concern continues to be safety on the streets; any improvement is unseen so far. Head teachers at private schools were recently given a course on how to cope with extortion threats, and police will now be able to shoot anyone caught in the act of committing crimes endangering the police.
